Next we were asked to take a pencil and draw progressively lighter areas from bottom to top on our page. Again we were surprised and delighted as shown by the examples below.

Finally Robyn gave us a photo of the face of a person and asked us to draw it. No body thought they could do it; but Robyn had a trick up her sleeve: She asked us to turn the photo upside down and draw what they saw while trying not to look at our drawing. This was really surprising because it made us see and draw the shapes on the photo rather than any preconceived ideas we had about what an eye or a nose should look like. News from the Potters.

2023 ended with the great news that the pottery studio is to get a new, larger and more efficient kiln. We did a good deal of research into the kilns available and finally decided that having one built to our own specifications was the best option. Our number 3 kiln is certainly well-used and with our membership at over 93 potters, we found that its relatively small cubic footage was limiting our ability to keep up with demand.

We took our proposal to the Hutt Art Society committee and to our delight they agreed to purchase the kiln and the potters will pay half the cost. For just over a year now, the potters have been running a pottery sale on the last Saturday of the month – weather permitting. It must be said that in 2023 the weather wasn't particularly kind, but over the scattered months that we have been setting up a table on the lawn outside the pottery studio we have put into our kiln fund close to \$5000. We intend to keep going to raise about \$9500 which is our share of the cost. Check us out on those Saturdays if you are looking for interesting pieces of pottery at very realistic prices – it all goes to the kiln fund. At the moment, a scarcity of element wire means that the building of the kiln is a bit delayed but we can hardly wait.

This means that we will be selling kiln 3 sometime later in the year. It is a four cubic foot internal capacity electric kiln which has been lovingly looked after and regularly maintained. If anyone knows of a person or group keen to have a kiln, please let me know!

I would like to pay tribute to three members of the now defunct Brushstrokes group who passed away last year. They were all long standing members of Hutt Art and contributed greatly to our Society.

Pauline Henderson: Pauline shifted to Waikanae a few years ago but until then was very involved in our society since first joining in 1994. She was talented in both watercolour and portraiture and for several years belonged to our Brushstrokes group where she produced beautiful paintings of flowers and still life.

She was, along with Ian McDonald, coordinator of the Portrait group and was unstinting in her guidance and encouragement to anyone who needed it. (She spoilt the group also with home baking every week). Pauline exhibited frequently, both here at Hutt Art and with the NZ Watercolour society and one year got the second placing in our Muriel Hopper award with a watercolour painting of a young woman. A major thrill for Pauline was having a work accepted in the highly prestigious Adam Portraiture award.

Jean Wallace: Jean has been a member of Hutt Art since 1993. We in the Brushstrokes group painted with her for 24 years and, like Pauline, she was very talented in watercolour painting. As well as travelling extensively around New Zealand she had many trips around the world which often included walking tours. As a result she painted the most beautiful NZ bush scenes and wonderful paintings from photos taken during her many travels. Jean also exhibited many times both here at Hutt Art and with both the NZ Watercolour society and the Academy of Fine Arts. It is only recently that she stopped attending our weekly Brushstrokes group

Annette Undrill: Annette joined Hutt Art Society in 1986 and was co-ordinator of the Brushstrokes group for around 25 years. She was also vice President for several years and was a great support to the then President Katie Terris.

Annette, like Pauline and Jean , was a talented watercolour artist and produced many beautiful paintings which invariably sold at our annual exhibition. She was also a member and contributor to Watercolour New Zealand. Annette was always willing to help anyone who needed help and guidance and we all benefited from her invaluable critiques and kindness. We miss her greatly.

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Editors Corner

In this newsletter, I thought I would continue with my articles on art museums we have visited, with an article on the Courtauld Institute Gallery in London. Many of you may have heard about the Courtauld Institute through the BBC series "Fake or Fortune". It is attached to the London University and offers research, graduate and post graduate studies in art history. It also has an excellent gallery that is open to the public.

The Courtauld Institute was conveniently located for us, just three train stops from our daughters place. It is in Somerset House on the northern banks of the Thames and across the river from Waterloo Station. The institute contains approximately 33,000 works, a research library of over 200,000 art historical books, journals and other research materials. Since the purpose of the institute is for art history research and study, only a selection of works are on display. Of particular interest to me were those showing the artists creation process.

The first art work was Manet's study for "Le Déjeuner sur l'herbe (Luncheon on the Grass). Some areas of the study are loosely defined like a figure in the background while other areas, such as the tree are defined in some detail. What surprised me was the study is about the same size as the original which is in the Orsay Museum in Paris.

The second, was Edgar Degas's "Dancer, Ready to Dance. Right Foot Forward". Approximately 150 clay and wax sculptures were found after Degas's death. The family had a number of casts made, but they needed strengthening. One could see a piece of wire protruding from the dancer's right hand. It's probably not very clear in the photo I took.
